Unsubstantiated means that there is not enough evidence to sustain the allegation. Pending classification refers to cases that have not yet closed. Finally, Unable to Complete is an investigation that cannot be concluded (Policy 14.7, Section C.6).</p> | | | |
| <p>** Previous History is defined as any Tennessee DCS contact with a child or family occurring within 3 years of the child's death or near death, as documented in the Department's SACWIS reporting system.</p> | | | |
| <p>Note: Effective January 1, 2014, the term "substantiated" replaced "indicated," and the term "unsubstantiated" replaced "unfounded." The change in wording does not impact the level of proof needed to substantiate.</p> | | | |
