Unsubstantiated means that there is not enough evidence to sustain the allegation. Pending classification refers to cases that have not yet closed. Finally, Unable to Complete is an investigation that cannot be concluded (Policy 14.7, Section C.6).

Note: Effective January 1, 2014, the term "substantiated" replaced "indicated," and the term "unsubstantiated" replaced "unfounded." The change in wording does not impact the level of proof needed to substantiate.
