Policy Statement:

The Department of Children's Services extends foster care services to young adults age eighteen (18)-up to age twenty-one (21) who meet established Title IV-E criteria and voluntarily agree to accept extension or reestablishment of foster care services as a young adult.

Purpose:

To assist young adults, age eighteen (18) up to age twenty-one (21), with the transition to adulthood with skills, knowledge, experience, and supports necessary for them to obtain education, housing, employment, health services and permanent supportive relationships.

Procedures:

A. Eligibility for Extension or Re-Establishment of Foster Care for Young Adults

Young adults are eligible to receive Extension of Foster Care Services, on the following basis:

- 1. Young adults who emancipate to adulthood directly from DCS custody at or after eighteen (18) years of age are eligible if the placement setting upon release from custody is an eligible foster care placement.
 - ◆ Youth housed in secure facilities upon attaining 18 years of age must subsequently be placed in an eligible foster care placement prior to release from custody in order to be eligible. Youth Development Centers and detention facilities are not eligible foster care placements.
- Is a United States citizen, or meets certain other guidelines to be considered a qualified alien (young adults who are undocumented residents of the United States are not eligible).
- 3. Young adults who reside in the State of Tennessee.

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- 4. Young adults who do not have countable assets exceeding ten thousand (\$10,000).
- 5. Young adults who voluntarily sign an agreement, DCS form CS-0488, Rights and Responsibilities to Receive Foster Care Services as an Adult, and CS-0968, Voluntary Placement Agreement for Transitioning Young Adults as applicable, in order to accept foster care as an adult to include acceptance of a DCS placement option or supervised independent living setting (case management plus an approved living situation).
- 6. Young adults must also meet one of the following eligibility criteria:
 - Is completing secondary education or a program leading to an equivalent credential; or
 - Is enrolled in an institution which provides post-secondary or vocational education; or
 - Is employed for at least eighty (80) hours per month; or
 - Is participating in a program or activity designed to promote or remove barriers to employment; or
 - Is not capable of doing any of the activities described in subdivisions of T.C.A 37-2-604 due to a medical condition, including a developmental or intellectual condition, which incapability is supported by regularly updated information in the Family Permanency Plan of the young adult. In such cases, the young adult complies with a course of treatment as recommended by the CFT.
- 7. The procedures for establishing approval for extension or re-establishment of foster care for young adults are outlined in the *Independent Living and* Transition Planning Guide. The completion of DCS form CS-0954, Certification of Eligibility for Title IV-E Fostering Connections; Extension or Re-Establishment of Foster Care for Young Adults, to include all applicable signatures is required when a new IV-E eligibility determination is needed.
- 8. Young adults eligible according to the criteria outlined above may return and request re-establishment of foster care until their twenty first (21st) birthday.
- B. Maintenance of **Eligibility for** Extension or Re-Establishment of **Foster Care for Young Adults**
- Young adults may be eligible to receive foster care services until the Family Permanency Plan goals are met, and there is an agreement by the Child and Family Team (CFT) that the young adult is reasonably capable of selfsufficiency. Eligibility must otherwise end upon the young adult's twenty first (21st) birthday.
- 2. Young adults, in conjunction with their CFT, determine the scope and appropriateness of service needs within the overall margins of eligibility as defined in this policy. Refer to DCS Policy 16.53, Eligibility for Independent Living Services, for information on available services. Factors that may jeopardize young adults' continued eligibility for foster care services may include:

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- Conviction of a felony offense;
- Exhibiting a pattern of behavior that jeopardizes the safety and wellbeing of self or others; or
- Consistently refusing to work collaboratively with the CFT or the court to make progress on mutually agreed upon goals, including educational objectives, and making reasonable efforts to increase self-sufficiency.

C. Services Available to Foster Care Eligible Young Adults

Young adults eligible for extension or re-establishment of foster care receive the following services as needed and applicable based on assessment, decisions made by the young adult and their teams, and continued availability of funding; additional eligibility criteria by category may apply and such criteria are available in the policies and protocols referenced. These include:

- Independent Living Wraparound Services as described in DCS Policy <u>16.53</u>, <u>Eligibility for Independent Living Services</u>, Section A and as outlined in the <u>Identifying and Accessing Independent Living Services Manual</u>.
- Housing assistance through placement support or supervised independent living options. The Independent Living Allowance may be provided according to the guidelines listed in DCS Policy 16.53, Eligibility for Independent Living Services, Sections B, and C. Refer to the Identifying and Accessing Independent Living Services Manual for details on administration of the Independent Living Allowance.
- 3. Case management services as outlined in the <u>Identifying and Accessing</u> <u>Independent Living Services Manual.</u>
- Scholarship Services- refer to DCS Policy <u>16.53, Eligibility for Independent Living Services</u>, Sections D, E, and F for details regarding eligibility, and the <u>Identifying and Accessing Independent Living Services Manual</u> for details on scholarship administration.

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Glossary:	
Term	Definition
Young adult:	A person who meets the definition of an "applicable child" according to federal and state legislative and statutory guidelines for maintenance of federal Title IV-E foster care. These criteria are established in Section A of this policy.
Worker	A term used to identify the position assigned the primary responsibility of building, preparing, supporting, and maintaining the Child and Family Team and coordinating the provision of services, when that position is not within DCS. An example includes provider agency staff assigned to case manage Extension of Foster Care cases.
Qualified Alien:	A qualified alien is a non-citizen who belongs to one of several alien categories established in the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA). Qualified aliens are potentially eligible for Federal benefits just like U.S. citizens.
Extension or Re- Establishment of Foster Care Services for Young Adults:	The eligibility criteria and procedures associated with providing Extension of Foster Care Services to young adults includes an array of services available to eligible persons. These services require case management by the assigned Workers, Independent Living Services staff, and Placement Services staff (as applicable). These services are voluntary and require a young adult's initial and on-going agreement to receive them.
Foster Family Home	The home of an individual or family licensed or approved as meeting the standards established by the State licensing or approval authority(ies) (or with respect to foster family homes on or near Indian reservations, by the tribal licensing or approval authority(ies), that provides 24-hour out-of-home care for children. The term may include group homes, agency operated boarding homes or other facilities licensed or approved for the purpose of providing foster care by the State or Tribal agency responsible for approval or licensing of such facilities.
Child Care Institution	A private child care institution, or a public child care institution which accommodates no more than twenty-five children, and is licensed by the appropriate State or Tribal licensing authority as meeting the standards established for such licensing. This definition must not include detention facilities, forestry camps, training schools, or any other facility operated primarily for the detention of children who are determined to be delinquent.

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
